

INSTRUMENT.

This survey was made with an Ainsworth Theodolite Transit. The courses were deflected from true meridian as determined by direct solar observation verified by Polaris observation. The distances were measured with 650 ft. and 100 ft. steel tapes.

R E P O R T .

The lode line of the location embraced within this claim was run directly upon the ground and the several corners established by means of offsets from the lode line. The tie lines were run by a traverse upon the ground and submitted in a separate report herewith.

The $\frac{1}{4}$ Sec. Cor. East Boundary of Sec. 25, T. 24 S., R. 57 E. M.D.M. is a dark gray to black limestone, averaging in size 12 ins. by 12 ins. at the base, 18 ins. high and showing 14 ins. above a small ~~stone~~ mound of limestone, chiseled, " $\frac{1}{2}$ " on the West face. This is the nearest standing corner of the Public Survey that can be found and identified. The W. $\frac{1}{4}$ Cor. and the S.W. Cor. Sec. 25, T. 24 S., R. 57 E., M.D.M. were searched for but could not be found.

Lookout Lode, Sur. No. 3575:-

All corners mentioned herein are pine posts 4 ins. square, properly set and scribed with correct survey and corner number thereon.
