The $\frac{1}{4}$ sec. cor. of sec. 31, T. 18 N., R. 61 E., monumented with an iron post, 1 in. diam., firmly set, mkd. and witnessed as described in the official record, bears S. $89^{\circ} 59'$ W., 10.30 chs. dist.

The cor. of secs. 31 and 32, T. 18 N., R. 61 E., heretofore described, bears N. $89^{\circ} 59'$ E., 29.70 chs. dist.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION

This township is located approximately 15 miles west-northwest of Ely, Nevada, and the Egan Mountain Range is located in a north-northwest direction through the center of the township. The elevation ranges from about 7,000 feet on the east side, and 6,800 feet on the west side, to about 9,000 feet to the top of the Egan Range.

There are no settlers in the township. Some of the area in the eastern portion of the township adjacent to the valley land has been cleared of the undergrowth and seeded to crested wheat grass and is used as range for sheep. The remainder of the township is used for stock grazing purposes.

The soil in the area is composed of a light colored textured alkaline clay in the valleys on both sides of the Egan Range and the range is sandy and gravelly stony.

The majority of the township is covered with pinon and juniper timber. Undergrowth consists mostly of sagebrush, shadscale, mahogany, rabbit brush and some greasewood.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration have a station located in the SE. portion of sec. 27.

U. S. Highway No. 50, an oil-surfaced road, traverses through the NE. portion of sec. 12 in a northwesterly direction through sec. 1, and leaves the township near the corner of secs. 1 and 2.
